Of the Five Civilized Tribes of Indians the Cherokees were early recognized as the greatest and the most civilized. Between 1789 and 1839, the Cherokee Nation became “civilized” by European standards. They developed a system of writing and printing. Their government had a written constitution and operated with executive, legislative, and judicial branches. At New Echota, Georgia, they built a modern capitol.

Cherokee, North American Indians of Iroquoian lineage who constituted one of the largest politically integrated tribes at the time of European colonization of the Americas. What is known quite certainly is that the Cherokee adopted a very decentralized way of life. There was no central chief of the Cherokee -- all of society was organized at the level of the town. Each town had a Town House, a Red Chief, and a White Chief. The older Town Houses were built as heptagons, with one side reserved for each of the seven clans.

The goal of “civilization” was to force Cherokees and other Indians away from their traditional occupations of hunting and warfare into livelihoods that resembled those of white citizens and settlers, such as farming. “Civilization” constrained Cherokee men who once derived their status through hunting and gift-giving.

Many Cherokees embraced this “civilization program.” The Cherokees established a court system, formally abandoned the law of blood revenge, and adopted a republican government. A Cherokee man named Sequoyah created the Cherokee syllabary, which enabled the Cherokees to read, write, record their laws, and publish newspapers in their own language.

The group, led by Major Ridge and including his son John, Elias Boudinot, and his brother Stand Watie, signed a treaty at New Echota in 1835. Despite the majority opposition to this treaty, opposition that was led by Principal Chief John Ross, the eastern lands were to be sold for \$4.5 million
